32nd ISPN Annual Meeting

The 32nd Annual Meeting de la International Society for Pediatric Neurosurgery (ISPN). was held in Argentina between August 28th and September 2nd, 2004. It was preceded by the 3rd Argentinean Course on Pediatric Neurosurgery sponsored by the ISPN. One of the two previous was held in the Iguazu Falls, province of Misiones, in 2000, and the other one in Tafi del Valle, province of Tucuman, in 2002. The congress venue was the Sheraton Buenos Aires Hotel & Convention Center and there was an active participation of colleagues coming from every corner of the world.
